

It is particularly important to test symptomatic individuals who are at higher risk. These individuals will continue to be prioritized and includes health-care workers, essential services providers and individuals who are vulnerable to complications due to COVID-19.

Rapid Antigen Testing Kits

The Government of BC has made Rapid Antigen Testing kits available for use at home. Use a rapid antigen test to find out if you have COVID-19. The results will be ready in less than 20 minutes. For information on how to use a Rapid Testing kit, see [BCCDC: Rapid Testing at Home](#).

Currently, individuals aged 18+ are eligible to get rapid antigen testing kits for free at some community pharmacies. Check the BC Pharmacy Association website for a [list of pharmacies](#) that are dispensing tests. You are allowed 1 kit every 28 days. You will need your Personal Health Number (PHN) to pick up your testing kit. For more information, see [Government of BC: Rapid Antigen Testing kits](#).

A test should only be used by people who develop symptoms of COVID-19 and want to confirm a positive or negative result. The tests are not suitable for international travel requirements.

COVID-19 Testing for Non-MSP Individuals

If you are in B.C. and are not eligible for MSP coverage, provincially insured health-care coverage for COVID-19 treatment may be available. This health care coverage applies to medical services related to COVID-19 infection. Services unrelated to COVID-19 that are performed on non-eligible MSP patients will remain uninsured. Your health care provider will be responsible for determining your eligibility for this coverage.
